History Notebook: Chapter Six: Picton Street

House numbers shown in italics in the text are the current ones. The map is dated 1828.

In May 1812 "20 lots of valuable land fronting the road from Stokes Croft Turnpike to Rennison's baths" were auctioned at the Full Moon. They were bought by two local businessmen (Benjamin Ralph and John Vaughan) who divided the land into building plots which they sold off individually. By 1816 the development of Picton Street was underway. It was named in honour of Lt. General Thomas Picton who

had been killed in the Battle of Waterloo the previous year.

Parish rate returns for 1824 show 48 properties occupied; they were mainly shops with a few private houses. The buildings were modest but substantial, with graceful doorways and some delicately carved shopfronts. There was ample accommodation for the



the shop and long back gardens with space to grow vegetables and keep chickens. The water supply came from a well in the cellar or garden and there was a communal pump at the bottom of the street.

The businesses in Picton Street were able to supply all the needs of the local community. In 1851 besides the usual butcher, baker and grocer there were three boot makers (one employing five men), three ironmongers, a dress and mantle maker, an organ builder, a straw hat and bonnet maker and two Dame Schools (31 and 46). In the 1870s there were three public houses: The General Picton (6), The Robert Burns (54) and The Crown and Dove (19), although the last-named was probably just a tap-room serving beer from the cask.

The two detached houses in the street were built for prosperous middle-class

families. An early owner of Picton House gave his occupation as 'gentleman' and Picton Lodge was for many years the office and residence of the parish Registrar of Births and Deaths. This bow-fronted Regency house originally had gardens running down to the brook and an open view to the Montpelier slopes.

Next door is the only surviving Charley-box in Bristol. It contains a nightwatchman's room and cells where those who breached the peace were locked up for the night. In the late 19th Century it became a watchmaker's workshop.


